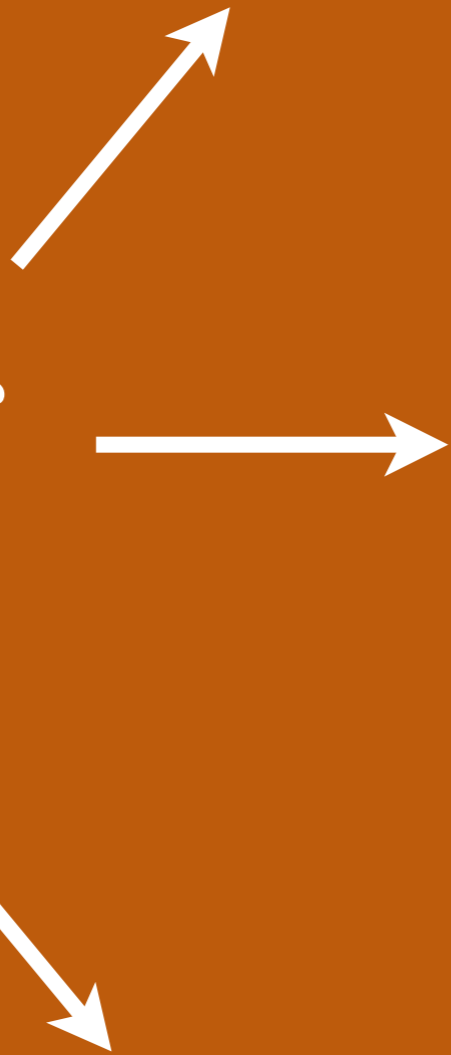

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Bloc Rockin' Beats – how Scandinavia became the dominant force at the Eurovision Song Contest

With parties bitterly divided over Europe, a voting system widely considered unfair, and tactical voting skewing the outcome, it's clearly that time of year again. The 60th annual Eurovision Song Contest is being held in Vienna following Conchita Wurst's victory last year in Copenhagen with *Rise Like A Phoenix*.

This year Sweden is the favourite at the bookmakers, with [Måns Zelmerlöw's Heroes](#) leading the betting at 2/1, making him the shortest odds favourite since 2012 when Loreen, also of Sweden, was priced at 6/4 and won easily with 372 points ahead of second placed Russia on 259. Should Zelmerlöw triumph, then it will continue Scandinavia's recent dominance in the competition, with four of the seven winners since Alexander Rybak's crushing win for Norway in 2009 hailing from Scandinavia.

It wasn't always this way, of course. Throughout much of the previous decade, it was the nations of the former Soviet Union (four wins and three second placed finishes from

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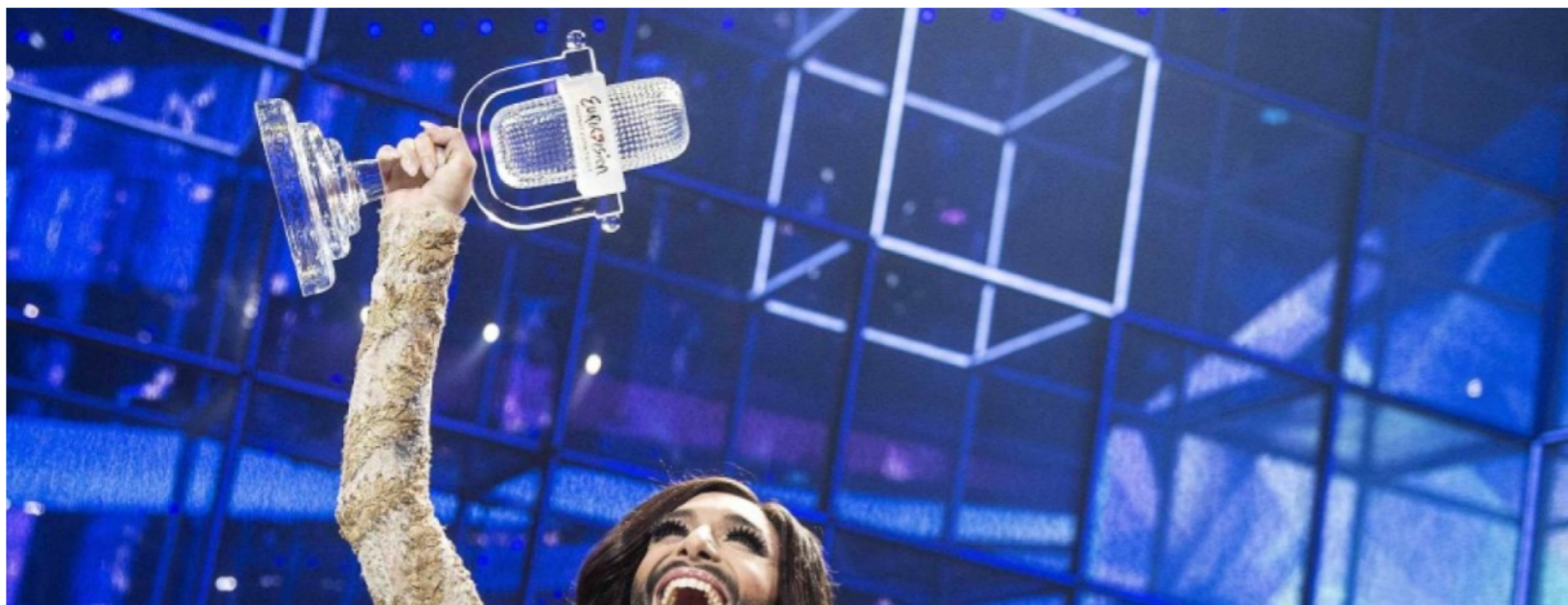

The Eurovision Song Contest, Europe's often outrageous and enduringly popular annual pop fest now in its 60th year, kicked off in Vienna on Saturday night. Among the 27 acts vying to follow in the footsteps of the 2014 champion, Austrian bearded drag queen Conchita Wurst, is Australia, competing for the first time. But whether former "Australian Idol" champion Guy Sebastian can wow the millions watching at home remains to be seen with tough

competition from the likes of Russia, Italy, Belgium and dark horse Serbia. The bookies' favourite though is chiseled Swede Mans Zelmerlow, hoping to repeat the magic of global superstar compatriots ABBA in 1974, with his song "Heroes".

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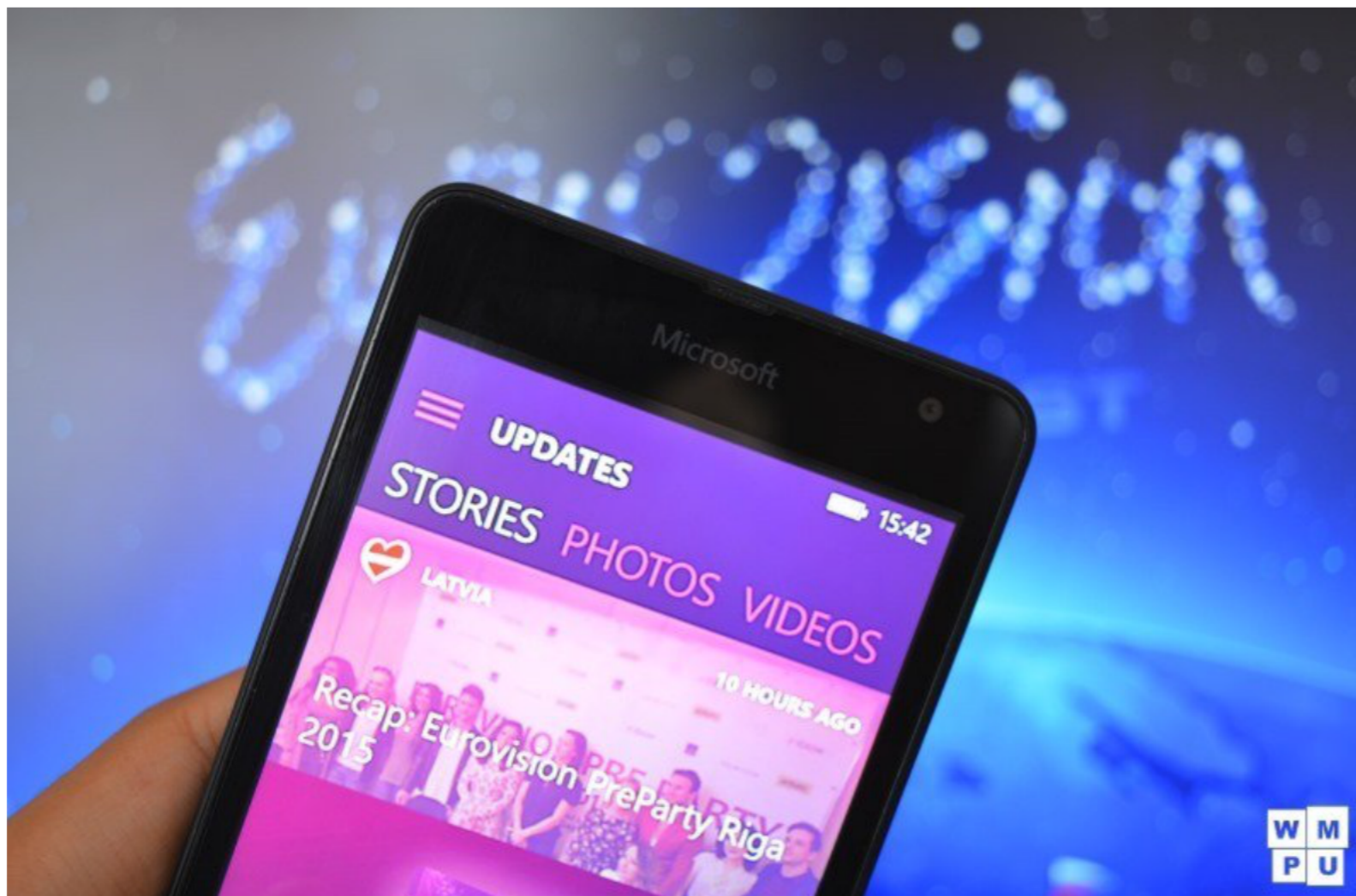

What do students need to know about what people do in order to master your learning goal?



Scholars do research, original research.

They do original research that connects to other scholars' research (past and present).

They usually study a specific aspect of a topic, not the whole thing.

They use citations to show these connections.

They write articles to share the results of their studies.

They usually publish these articles in things called journals.

They want their studies to be used (cited) by other scholars.

They write for other scholars (not the general public) in these articles.

They belong to professional communities called disciplines.

They review articles written by other scholars in their discipline for quality.

Disciplines develop best practices or standards for conducting and communicating research. They're not all the same.

They apply the standards of their discipline when they review articles for quality.

They do not repeat the studies when they review articles for quality.

They continue examining, evaluating and testing the quality of research after the articles are published.

They make arguments, but of a particular type. They are not trying to have the last word. They expect good research to inspire more questions.

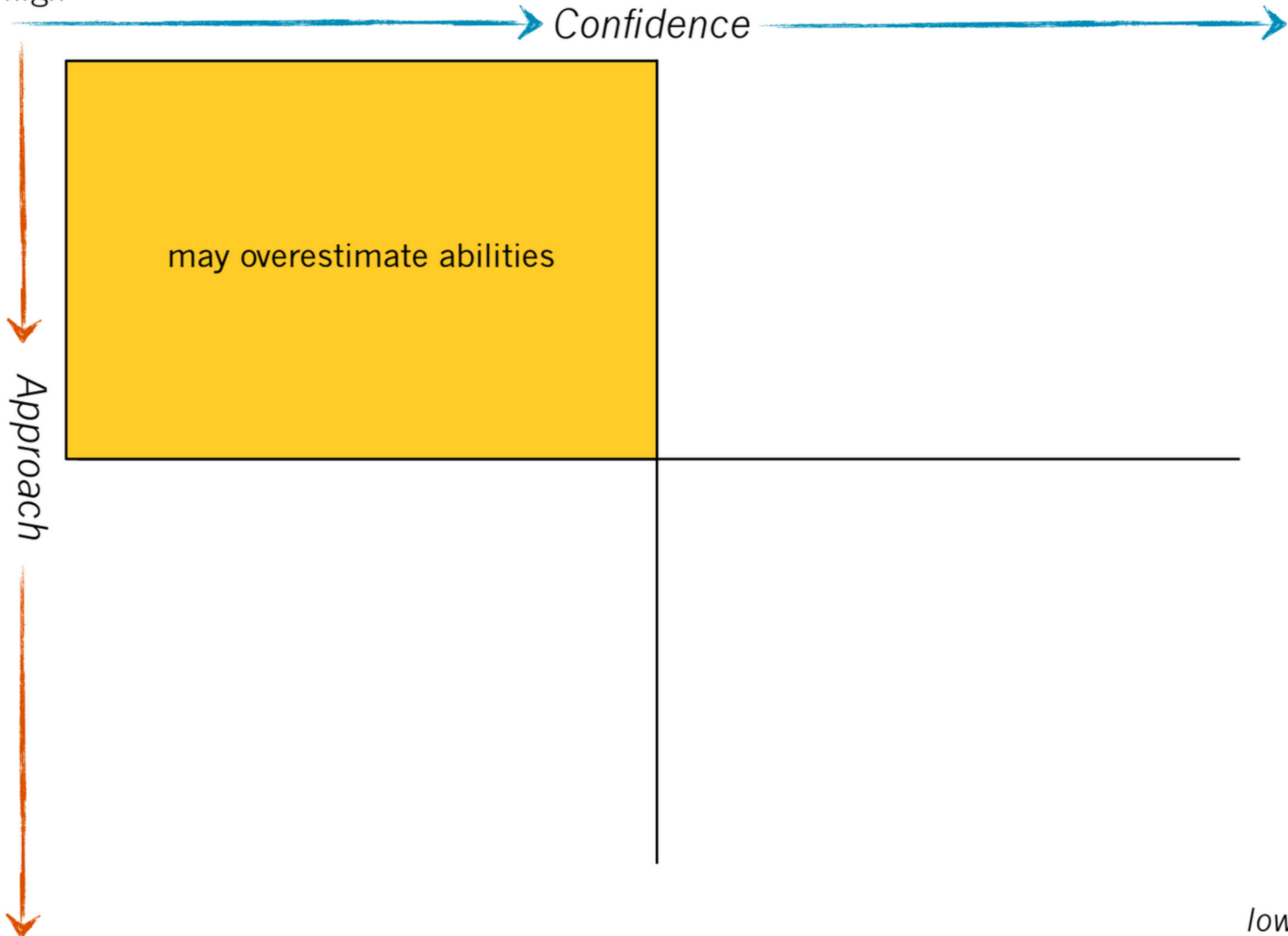

Amazon to Stop Funneling European Sales Through Low-Tax Haven

In the continuing battle between Europe and American tech companies, score one for Europe.



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In a move that could put pressure on its rivals to follow suit, [Amazon](#) will start paying taxes in a number of European countries where it has large operations, instead of funneling nearly all its sales through Luxembourg, a low-tax haven that is the home base in the region for [Amazon](#) and many other large tech companies.

Several European countries, including Germany and France, have criticized the tax strategies of some American tech companies, including [Google](#), which use complicated structures that sharply reduce the amount of tax they pay in individual European countries.

The [European Commission](#), the executive arm of the European Union, is also investigating whether [Apple](#) and Amazon receive unfair state support through low-tax agreements in Ireland and Luxembourg, respectively, where the companies run their European operations.

On May 1, Amazon said that it had started reporting revenue from its operations in Britain, Germany, Italy and Spain. By altering how it

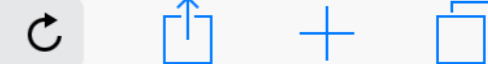
